



1st Lt. Henry L. Godbold
Pennsylvania 1st Light Artillery, Battery F
Of East Walpole, Massachusetts

Injured 23 August, 1862, at the Fords of the Rappahanock River, Virginia, in action against enemy Rebel forces during a fierce artillery duel. He died of his wounds, September 27th, Washington, DC.

Buried in East Walpole Cemetery, East Walpole, Massachusetts

“He is dead, but thank God, the country for which he died still lives, and God grant that she may live for ever, to enshrine in "her heart of hearts," the memory of her noble defenders.”

(Dedham Gazette; Oct. 18, 1862; pg. 2, col. 3.)

His noble sacrifice was part of the effort made by numerous Walpole men to maintain the Union and to free nearly four million people from the bonds of slavery


