

On April 18, 1685 Cherles Josias alias Wampatuck gave a confirmatory deed to the town of Dedham reserving Two Hundred Acres of Land in the elbow between Dorchester Line and Meponset River next the said Line near Goodman Vales and other Inhabitants near the Saw Mill of Dedham to be surveyed and laid out by the Inhabitants thereof; also that myself and ye Puncapogg Indians shall have full and free Liberty of Hunting according to Law within the precincts of Dedham.

Charles Josiah alias Wampatuck was the som of Chickstabut.

I have surveyed and laid out for Nathaniel Page a certain tract of land being situated and lying to the south west of Neponset Bridge within the limits of the town of Dedham in the County of () begining at a markt tree standing on the south side Neponset River where the dividing line between Dedham and Dorchester crosses the said River and runs by said line by a range of marked trees and stakes south-west one degree southerly ninety-two chains and then turns north sixty-two chains to Neponset River and so by said river as it runs easterly to the marked tree where first begun, at. In form triangular and is bounded south and west by common land not laid out and northerly by Neponset River, containing within said bounds two hundred acres.

Indian Deed of Dedhem

Country Road and then in bredth by the County Road north twenty-five dagrees Easterly twenty-six chains and then in Length West twenty-four chains (to the) tree where first began being bounded north-east and south-west by the Commons not laid out East by the Country Road and North-west by the former land, containing seventy acres being in all two hundred and seventy acres.

Isaac Newton Lewis, the historian, lived in the white house in back of the little Lewis Park where the equestrian statue of his ancestor, Lieut. Barachiah Lewis was erected. He was born and died in this house. He told my father in 1928 that looking out his side door, the stone-wall opposite, on the south, bounding the Lewis farm, was the south boundary of the old Indian reservation. Indian arrowheads have been found around his place. The hill in back called "the pinicle" was the spot where Charles Josias, son of Josias who was a son of Chitf Chicketabut, had his wigwam. A valley further along in Plimptonville, near they planted their corn. A little further along in Plimptonville, near the peponset River, is still to be seen an old Indian mortar in a ledge in the grass. In his Lewis family History he says that his land was the extreme westerly border of the old Indian reservation.



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

Deacon-Ebenezer Fales House Burned down-1922




Map showing the site of the Descon Ebenezer Fales house. He was one of the earliest Descons of the First Church of Walpole, Mass.





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North Street, Walpole, Mass. -1733

North Street-- "A rhoad laid out by Capt. Morse, Joseph Hartshorn and Thomas Clap, Feb. 25, 1733. Laid out 2 Rods wife from Bubbling Brook between the land of Eleazer Bullard and James Jero so far as their land goes, from thence to the house of Moses Ellis as straight as may be, and from said Jacob's house to Nathaniel Gay's farm, as it is marked out, and from Gay's Morse farm to the house of Jeremiah Day, as straight as may be, and from said Day's to the Wrentham road as straight as may be, between John Hall's and Thomas Hartshorn's. The above said road was proposed and accepted by the town at their anniversary meeting in March 1734"-- from Walpole Town records, copied from Isaac Newton Lewis's "History of Walpole".

note -- the Wrentham road is now Main street.

note-2 I believe Mr. Lewis when copying from the town records left out a line, ie: He traces the road down to Moses Ellis's house, but does not continue it on to the Jacob's house, but jumps that stretch of the road, and continues from the Jacob house onto Nathaniel Gay's farm. Who was this Jacob? I have looked through the Walpole Vital Records, (births, marriages and deaths) printed from the town records up to the year 1850, and have found no family by the name of Jacobs, which makes me believe that it the first name of one of the settlers on North street, and not his last name.

note-3 The Woods house on North street is said to have been built in 1814, according to an old resident of that location. It is probably the house of Major John A.Gould. In 1894 I believe Luther Fisher lived in this house. He was a farmer. His brother Nathaniel Fisher lived on the original old Fisher farm on Fisher street. This Fisher house was a small one, I believe two or three houses have been built successively on the site of the original Fisher farm house on Fisher St. The farm was on the left going up Fisher St. from Main St. I have a small sketch of the house made from memory by my father.

I believe a Mr. Turner or Taylor, who was caretaker of Rural Cemetery

in 1920 lived in the Woods-Guild house.

note-4 The Goss farm, on North St. The land stretched down as far as High street. In 1851 a Thomas Clap lived there. He was a blacksmith and had a small shop in his yard side of his house. He made door latches, hinges and nails for the houses being built in town in his day. I have an old door latch from this old farm house. Daniel Goos bought the farm. He was born in Germany Oct.28,1833 and died on this farm July 25,1892. His wife had died on Dec.7,1868 aged 41 yrs. The neighbors heard the cows lowing and not having seen Mr.Goss for a few days they investigated and found him dead in bed. He had been dead several days. He d. July 25,1892. Both he and his wife are buried in Maple Grove cemetery. I was told that yet another owner of this farm, while going to work crossing the field or woods

opposite his house, dropped dead. His body was found by neighbors later on.

North Street, North Walpole, Mass.

North street families or farms in 1733. -- starting from the old Wrentham Road, which is now Main Street., to Bubbling Brook.

1-John Hall

2-Thomas Hartshorn-(lived opposite John Hall's farm.)

3-Jeremiah Day's house

4-Nathaniel Gay's farm "as marked out".

5-Jacob ----?'s house

6-Moses Ellis's house

7-James Jero's land

8-Eleazer Bullard's land (opposite James Jero's.)

This would indicate that there were only 8 farms on North street in 1733. As Nathaniel Gay's farm was described "as marked out" would indicate that it was a new farm and that house and farm buildings had not been built, at the time.

Of the old houses on North street today (1966) perhaps the oldest, which might have been standing in 1733, are the following:
